Course Description:

An examination of the structures and functions of legislative bodies, with an emphasis on the U.S. Congress. Focus will be placed on the topics of representation, congressional elections, rules, norms, and procedures, interaction with the executive and judicial branches, and legislative policymaking

Course Goals and Objectives:

What role does Congress play in 21st century politics? Is Congress truly the "broken branch" among U.S. federal institutions? These questions frame our analysis of Congress this semester, as we reflect on the 2016 election, and look forward to the 115th Congress. We will address five Political Science learning goals: 1) content knowledge of Political Science, 2) critical thinking, 3) writing, 4) speaking, and 5) responsible citizenship. To achieve these goals, you will learn to:

- Understand, analyze, synthesize, and apply Political Science methods and models used to study Congress.
- Identify, interpret, critique, and apply relevant scholarly sources, information, and data about Congress.
- Present ideas, research, and analysis using critical writing and communication skills.
- Apply content knowledge to understand ongoing congressional events, policies, and elections.
- Engage with diverse ideas, individuals, groups, and cultures related to Congress.
- Identify professional opportunities related to the study of Congress.

Textbook:

Congress and It's Members (15th Edition) by Davidson et al. Referred to as DOLS henceforth.
